Presence Pathway

An Invitation to Encounter God

Upstate Church is in a new season. We have entered into a two-year initiative called Encounter, a focused pursuit of becoming people who pray with expectancy, live in the presence of God, and walk in the power of God. This initiative is not about adding more activity to our calendars, but about shaping the culture of our church. It is a call to deepen our dependence on God and to reorder our lives around His presence.

This guide is not the goal of the Encounter initiative, but we hope it is a catalyst for you. It is designed to help you slow down, listen to God's Word, and intentionally respond to God. Our prayer is that as you open Scripture, you will begin to position yourself to meet with God. We cannot manufacture encounters with God, but we can put ourselves in a position of readiness.

This journey walks through the Gospel of John, five days per week, forty days total, alongside your weekly class or video session. Each week's devotionals connect with that week's theme, grounding you in the person of Jesus as you prepare for Encounter Week.

Week 1 - Day 1 - The Word Who Was

Bottom Line

Jesus, the eternal Word, has always existed.

Prayer Prompt

Father, before I read today, open my eyes. Help me not to read past the words on the page, but to encounter You, the Word who became flesh. In Jesus' name, amen.

Scripture Reading

John 1:1-5

Devotional

John does not ease us into his Gospel. He drops us into eternity. "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God." Before creation. Before time. Before anything, the Word was already there. This introduction is a theological declaration. John is telling us from the very first verse who Jesus is. He is not a great teacher who arrived on the scene in Bethlehem. He is the eternal God who stepped into time. All things were made through Him. In Him was life, and that life was the light of men. To encounter Jesus is not to encounter a religious figure. It is to encounter the One who was there before the beginning began, the same One who now invites us to know Him.

Prayer

Lord Jesus, You are the Word who was in the beginning. Help me encounter You today not as a distant figure of history, but as the living God. Open my heart to receive the light You bring. Amen.

Week 1 - Day 3 - Born of God

Bottom Line

Encountering God begins with being born again.

Prayer Prompt

Father, remind me today of the miracle of new birth. I did not choose You first. You chose me. Thank You. In Jesus' name, amen.

Scripture Reading

John 1:9-18

Devotional

"But to all who did receive him, who believed in his name, he gave the right to become children of God, who were born, not of blood nor of the will of the flesh nor of the will of man, but of God." The Gospel of John makes something clear from the start: coming to God is not a human achievement. It is a divine gift. To become a child of God is not earned through religious effort, moral performance, or family heritage. It is received through faith, and that faith itself is born of God. This is humbling and liberating at the same time. Humbling because it means we cannot boast. Liberating because it means our standing before God does not rest on our track record. If you have received Jesus, you are a child of God, not because of what you have done, but because of what He has done.

Prayer

Father, thank You for adopting me. Help me live today not as a servant striving to earn Your approval, but as a child resting in Your love. In Jesus' name, amen.

Week 1 - Day 5 - You Must Be Born Again

Bottom Line

True encounter with God requires spiritual transformation.

Prayer Prompt

Holy Spirit, do the work in me today that only You can do. Where I have grown cold or comfortable, stir me. In Jesus' name, amen.

Scripture Reading

John 3

Devotional

Nicodemus is a Pharisee, educated, religious, and morally serious. He comes to Jesus at night with questions, and Jesus cuts right to the heart of the matter: "You must be born again." Nicodemus is confused. Jesus is talking about a spiritual transformation that only God can initiate. This conversation is one of the most important in all of Scripture because Jesus makes it clear: encountering God is not about being religious enough, knowing enough theology, or attending enough services. It is about being spiritually transformed from the inside out by the Spirit of God. And then comes John 3:16, perhaps the most quoted verse in the Bible. God so loved the world that He gave His only Son. This is the heart of the Gospel. The new birth is not something we work up. It flows from the love of a God who sent His Son not to condemn the world, but to save it.

Prayer

Father, thank You for loving the world, for loving me, enough to send Your Son. Renew me by Your Spirit today. Help me not to settle for religion when You are offering a relationship. In Jesus' name, amen.

Week 2 - Day 1 - Living Water for the Thirsty

Bottom Line

Jesus pursues the broken and offers what only He can give.

Prayer Prompt

Jesus, You know me fully, my history, my failures, my thirst. Like the woman at the well, help me to receive what only You can give today. Amen.

Scripture Reading

John 4:1-26

Devotional

The Samaritan woman at the well is not who most religious leaders would stop for. She is the wrong ethnicity, the wrong gender by cultural standards, and her personal history is complicated. Yet Jesus goes out of His way to be there. He sits down, asks for a drink, and opens a conversation that will change her life forever. "If you knew the gift of God, and who it is that is saying to you, 'Give me a drink,' you would have asked him, and he would have given you living water." Jesus is not interested in her past. He is offering her a future. He is offering her Himself. The saving God does not wait for us to get our lives together before He draws near. He meets us at the well, in our mess, in our thirst, in the middle of our broken stories, and He offers us what nothing else can satisfy.

Prayer

Jesus, I am thirsty in ways I cannot always name. Meet me where I am. Give me what only You can give. Help me drink deeply of You today. Amen.

Week 2 - Day 3 - Rise and Walk

Bottom Line

Jesus has authority over everything that holds us captive.

Prayer Prompt

Lord Jesus, there are places in my life where I have been lying by the pool for a long time. Speak the Word today. In Your name, amen.

Scripture Reading

John 5:1-17

Devotional

The man by the pool of Bethesda has been unable to walk for thirty-eight years. Every day, people around him get into the healing waters. Every day, he is left behind. Jesus walks up and asks him a question that seems almost strange: “Do you want to be healed?” It is not a cruel question. It is an honest one. Sometimes we grow so accustomed to our condition that we lose hope for something different. Jesus does not ask the man to prove his faith or meet a religious requirement. He simply commands: “Rise, pick up your bed and walk.” And the man is healed. The saving God does not merely forgive our past. He has authority over the things that have left us immobilized, the wounds, the patterns, the long-standing places of brokenness. And He still speaks the same word.

Prayer

Jesus, You have authority over all that holds me back. Speak to the places in me that have grown still and hopeless. Help me rise today in the power You provide. Amen.

Week 2 - Day 4 - The Bread of Life

Bottom Line

Jesus is the only one who can truly satisfy our deepest hunger.

Prayer Prompt

Lord, I confess I often try to satisfy my soul with things that cannot nourish it. Help me come to You today as the bread of life. Amen.

Scripture Reading

John 6:1-40

Devotional

The crowd has just witnessed Jesus feed five thousand people with five loaves and two fish. Now they track Him down across the lake, and Jesus sees right through their motive: “You are seeking me, not because you saw signs, but because you ate your fill of the loaves.” They want what Jesus gives. They do not yet want Jesus Himself. So Jesus makes the most audacious offer: “I am the bread of life; whoever comes to me shall not hunger, and whoever believes in me shall never thirst.” He is not offering a spiritual supplement to add to an already full life. He is claiming to be the very substance of life itself. The God who saves meets the hunger beneath the hunger, the deep longing that all our striving, accumulating, and consuming was never designed to fill. Only Jesus satisfies.

Prayer

Jesus, You are the bread of life. Forgive me for the times I settle for lesser things when You are offering Yourself. Feed my soul today with what only You can give. Amen.

Week 2 - Day 5 - Lord, to Whom Shall We Go?

Bottom Line

Saving faith holds on to Jesus even when it is hard.

Prayer Prompt

Lord, when the road gets hard and the crowds thin out, help me be one who stays. In Jesus' name, amen.

Scripture Reading

John 6:41-71

Devotional

After Jesus declares Himself the bread of life, many of His disciples find it too difficult and begin to walk away. Jesus turns to the Twelve and asks: "Do you want to go away as well?" Peter's answer is one of the most honest and beautiful confessions in the Gospels: "Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life." Peter does not say he understands everything Jesus is teaching. He does not say this has been easy. He says there is nowhere else to go. You alone have what we need. This is what saving faith looks like in real life, not the absence of difficulty or confusion, but the conviction that Jesus is the only one worth holding on to. The God who saves keeps those who are His. Even when we are weak, confused, or shaken, He holds us fast.

Prayer

Lord, to whom else would I go? You have the words of eternal life. When I am confused or weary, help me hold on to this: there is no better place to be than with You. Amen.

Week 3 - Day 1 - Teaching That Is Not His Own

Bottom Line

God's Word comes from God Himself, and it transforms those who receive it.

Prayer Prompt

Father, as I open Your Word today, help me approach it not as information to master, but as a message from You. Speak to me. In Jesus' name, amen.

Scripture Reading

John 7:1-24

Devotional

Jesus arrives at the feast and begins teaching. The religious leaders are stunned. He has not studied in their schools, yet He speaks with an authority they cannot explain. Jesus clarifies the source: "My teaching is not mine, but his who sent me." The words Jesus speaks are not the words of a gifted teacher. They are the words of the eternal God. This is why Scripture is not like other books. The Bible is not simply wise human writing about God. It is God's own self-disclosure, breathed out by Him, bearing His authority, and alive by His Spirit. Every time we open the Bible, we are not reading about God from a distance. We are hearing from God Himself. The question Jesus poses is honest and searching: are we seeking God's will, or our own? The posture we bring to God's Word determines how we hear it.

Prayer

Father, Your Word is not mine to manage. It is Yours to speak. Help me come to it with open hands and a humble heart. Speak to me today. In Jesus' name, amen.

Week 3 - Day 2 - Rivers of Living Water

Bottom Line

The Spirit of God is the one who makes God's Word alive in us.

Prayer Prompt

Holy Spirit, You are the one who illuminates the Word. Without You, I cannot understand what God is saying. Open my eyes today. In Jesus' name, amen.

Scripture Reading

John 7:25-39

Devotional

On the last and greatest day of the Feast of Tabernacles, when the priests were pouring water at the altar as a symbol of God's provision, Jesus stands up and cries out: "If anyone thirsts, let him come to me and drink. Whoever believes in me, as the Scripture has said, 'Out of his heart will flow rivers of living water.'" The living water Jesus offers is the Holy Spirit, poured out on everyone who believes. And the Spirit is the one who makes the Word alive. This is why Bible reading is never just an academic exercise. The same Spirit who inspired the Scriptures lives inside every believer, and He opens our eyes to understand what God has said. When we read with prayer and expectancy, the Spirit takes the words on the page and makes them living and active in our hearts.

Prayer

Holy Spirit, flow through my reading of the Word today. Take the truth I encounter and plant it deep in my heart. Make it more than information. Make it transformation. Amen.

Week 3 - Day 3 - The Truth That Sets Us Free

Bottom Line

Abiding in God's Word is what leads to true freedom.

Prayer Prompt

Lord Jesus, where I have believed lies about myself, about You, or about the world, replace them with Your truth. In Your name, amen.

Scripture Reading

John 8:1-38

Devotional

"If you abide in my word, you are truly my disciples, and you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free." These words of Jesus are some of the most quoted in all of Christianity, and also some of the most misunderstood. Jesus is not talking about freedom in a general sense. He is talking about freedom from sin, from the patterns, the bondage, the captivity that our rebellion against God has produced. The path to that freedom is specific: abide in God's Word. Not just read it occasionally or reference it when convenient. Abide. Remain in it, make your home in it, return to it daily, let it form the framework through which you see everything else. The God who speaks is also the God who frees. And He does His freeing work primarily through the consistent, faithful, humble engagement with His Word.

Spiritual Discipline - Silence and Solitude

In John 8, Jesus is constantly surrounded by crowds, debates, and confrontation. Yet He consistently withdraws from the crowds in order to be alone with the Father. Practice silence and solitude today. Withdraw from your phone and the busyness for 15-20 minutes and just be still.

Prayer

Lord, Your Word is truth. Help me abide in it, not just visit it, so that I would know the freedom You have purchased for me. Expose every lie and replace it with what is true. Amen.

Week 3 - Day 5 - One Thing I Know

Bottom Line

A genuine encounter with Jesus produces a testimony no one can take from you.

Prayer Prompt

Lord, anchor my faith not just in what I have been taught, but in what I have personally experienced of You. In Jesus' name, amen.

Scripture Reading

John 9:13-41

Devotional

The man born blind stands before the religious authorities, who are furious that Jesus healed on the Sabbath. They press him with theological arguments and demands. His response is one of the most disarming in the Gospels: "Whether he is a sinner I do not know. One thing I do know, that though I was blind, now I see." He does not have a sophisticated theology. He cannot win every argument. But no one can take away his personal encounter with Jesus. And by the end of the chapter, when Jesus seeks him out and reveals Himself more fully, the man worships. This is what encountering the God who speaks does: it gives us something to say. Not just a belief system to defend, but a story to tell. I was blind, but now I see. The God who speaks transforms those who truly hear Him, and that transformation becomes our testimony.

Prayer

Lord Jesus, I may not be able to answer every question, but I know this: You have changed me. Give me the courage to tell my story, and help me keep encountering You so the story keeps growing. Amen.

Week 4 - Day 1 - The Good Shepherd

Bottom Line

Jesus knows you by name and calls you to follow Him.

Prayer Prompt

Good Shepherd, I want to know Your voice more clearly. Quiet the competing voices in my life and help me hear You above them all. In Your name, amen.

Scripture Reading

John 10

Devotional

“I am the good shepherd. I know my own and my own know me.” This is a personal and intimate relationship. Shepherds in the ancient world did not manage flocks from afar. They lived with them, named them, knew their individual quirks, and led them by the sound of their voice. Jesus says His sheep know His voice. They follow Him not because they are forced to, but because they recognize Him. And He knows them. He calls them by name. Positioning ourselves to encounter God begins here: learning to distinguish His voice from all the others. The Good Shepherd speaks through His Word, through prayer, through the wisdom of His people, and through the quiet work of the Spirit. But we must be listening. We must create enough stillness in our lives to actually hear.

Prayer

Good Shepherd, teach me Your voice. Help me follow You, not the voices of fear, ambition, or distraction. I am Yours. Lead me today. Amen.

Week 4 - Day 2 - I Am the Resurrection and the Life

Bottom Line

Jesus has power over death, and over every place in us that feels dead.

Prayer Prompt

Lord Jesus, You are the resurrection and the life. Speak life today into the places in me that feel most dead. In Your name, amen.

Scripture Reading

John 11:1-27

Devotional

Lazarus is dead. He has been in the tomb four days by the time Jesus arrives. Mary and Martha are grieving, and not without a trace of honest anguish: “Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died.” Jesus does not deflect their grief. He meets it with a declaration that reorders everything: “I am the resurrection and the life. Whoever believes in me, though he die, yet shall he live.” Before Jesus performs the miracle, He offers this truth. Before the tomb is opened, He makes the claim. He is not just the one who can raise the dead. He is the source of life itself. Positioning ourselves to encounter God means trusting Him with our dead places. The grief, the loss, the dreams that seem buried, the spiritual dryness that has settled in. We bring all of it to the One who says: I am the resurrection.

Prayer

Jesus, You are the resurrection and the life. I bring to You the places in me that feel most lifeless. Speak. Roll away the stone. Bring me out. Amen.

Week 4 - Day 3 - Jesus Wept

Bottom Line

Jesus enters our grief, and grief in His presence leads to encounter.

Prayer Prompt

Lord Jesus, thank You that You are not unmoved by my pain. Help me bring my grief to You honestly today. In Your name, amen.

Scripture Reading

John 11:28-44

Devotional

In the shortest verse in the Bible, “Jesus wept,” we are given one of the most profound windows into the heart of God. Jesus knows He is about to raise Lazarus. He knows the story ends in triumph. And yet, standing at the tomb of His friend, surrounded by grieving people, He weeps. He is not performing. He is not pretending. He is genuinely moved by the grief of the people He loves. The God we seek to encounter is not a distant deity who is unmoved by our suffering. He enters it. He weeps with those who weep. And then He acts. “Lazarus, come out!” The dead man walks out of the tomb. Grief becomes witness. The posture that positioned this crowd to encounter God was not triumphant confidence. It was honest sorrow brought into His presence.

Prayer

Lord Jesus, You wept. You are not far from my grief. I bring to You today what I have been carrying alone. Meet me here. And in Your time, speak life. Amen.

Week 4 - Day 4 - She Has Done a Beautiful Thing

Bottom Line

Extravagant devotion to Jesus is always worth it.

Prayer Prompt

Lord, I want to offer You more than what is convenient. Help me come to You today with an open, generous, devoted heart. Amen.

Scripture Reading

John 12:1-8

Devotional

Six days before the Passover, Mary takes a pound of expensive perfume, worth nearly a year’s wages, and pours it on Jesus’ feet. Judas objects. It is wasteful, he says. It could have been sold and the money given to the poor. Jesus silences the objection: “Leave her alone.” What Mary is doing is not wasteful. It is worship. It is the posture of someone who has encountered Jesus and responded with everything she has. She is not calculating the cost. She is responding to the worth of the One she loves. Positioning ourselves to encounter God requires this kind of extravagance. Not the extravagance of money or possessions, but the extravagance of heart, of time, of attention, of priority. It is the willingness to give to Jesus what the world would call excessive, because we know He is worth it.

Prayer

Lord Jesus, I want to be a Mary, not calculating the cost, but responding to Your worth. Help me give You my best today. You are worth it. Amen.

Week 4 - Day 5 - A Grain of Wheat

Bottom Line

True encounter with God leads through surrender, not around it.

Prayer Prompt

Lord, where I am holding on too tightly, help me open my hands today. In Jesus' name, amen.

Scripture Reading

John 12:9-50

Devotional

“Unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains alone; but if it dies, it bears much fruit.” Jesus says this as He is approaching the cross. He is describing His own death, and He is describing the pattern for all who would follow Him. The life that God offers does not come from self-preservation. It comes through surrender. The grain that refuses to be planted remains alone, unchanged, unfruitful. The grain that surrenders to the ground, that looks like loss from the outside, produces a harvest that the intact grain could never have imagined. Positioning ourselves to encounter God always involves surrender. Not one dramatic surrender, but the daily practice of releasing our grip on our own comfort, plans, reputation, and control, trusting the One who said it is through dying that we live.

Prayer

Lord, I want to bear fruit. But I confess I often want it without surrender. Help me trust You enough to open my hands today. Plant what You need to plant. I trust the harvest to You. Amen.

Week 5 - Day 1 - The Basin and the Towel

Bottom Line

True worship begins with humility before God and one another.

Prayer Prompt

Lord Jesus, You took the basin and the towel. Help me receive what You have done for me, and then live it out toward others. Amen.

Scripture Reading

John 13:1-20

Devotional

“Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going back to God, rose from supper. He laid aside his outer garments, and taking a towel, tied it around his waist.” Notice what John says before Jesus picks up the towel: He knows who He is. He knows He has all authority. He knows where He came from and where He is going. And it is precisely from that secure identity that He kneels to wash dirty feet.

Revival that flows upward begins with this kind of humility, not the humility of low self-esteem, but the humility of someone who knows they are loved, secure, and held by God, and therefore has nothing to prove. Rightly ordered worship makes us small before God and generous toward others. When we truly see who God is, we stop grasping and we start serving.

Prayer

Lord Jesus, You washed feet. Humble my heart today. Free me from the need to be seen, exalted, or protected, and help me love others from the secure place of being loved by You. Amen.

Week 5 - Day 3 - The Spirit Within Us

Bottom Line

The Holy Spirit is God's presence living inside us.

Prayer Prompt

Holy Spirit, You are the presence of God within me. Fill me today. Do through me what I cannot do on my own. In Jesus' name, amen.

Scripture Reading

John 14:12-21

Devotional

"Truly, truly, I say to you, whoever believes in me will also do the works that I do; and greater works than these will he do, because I am going to the Father." The disciples must have been stunned. Greater works than Jesus? How? Because Jesus is going to the Father and sending the Spirit. The Helper, the Holy Spirit, will be with believers not just alongside them as Jesus was, but within them. The presence of God, poured out into human hearts, means the work of Jesus can extend into every corner of the earth simultaneously through His people. Revival flowing upward means we recognize that the life we live is not our own. The Spirit who raised Jesus from the dead lives inside us. That is not a small truth. It is world-altering. And it is meant to produce deep reverence and awe in us for the God who has chosen to dwell within us.

Prayer

Holy Spirit, I am Your dwelling place. Fill me. Work through me. Help me not to grieve or quench You, but to walk in step with You today. In Jesus' name, amen.

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The peace Jesus gives is unlike anything the world offers.

Lord Jesus, I receive the peace You are offering today. Help me stop reaching for lesser things to calm my heart. Amen.

John 14:22-31

"Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. Not as the world gives do I give to you. Let not your hearts be troubled, neither let them be afraid." The peace Jesus offers is not the absence of conflict or difficulty. It is a settled confidence in the goodness and sovereignty of God, even in the middle of trouble. The world offers peace through comfort, control, and the absence of problems. Jesus offers peace in the middle of the storm. Revival flowing upward produces this kind of peace. When our hearts are rightly oriented toward God, when we are worshiping the One who holds all things, anxiety loses its grip. Not because circumstances improve, but because we are anchored to the God who is above all circumstances. This peace is a gift from Jesus, and it is ours to receive.

Lord Jesus, I accept the peace You are offering. Help me stop trying to manufacture calm through control, and instead rest in the truth that You hold all things. Guard my heart and mind with Your peace. Amen.

Week 5 - Day 5 - Abide in Me

Bottom Line

The fruitful life flows from staying connected to Jesus.

Prayer Prompt

Lord Jesus, I want to abide in You, not just visit You. Help me stay today. Amen.

Scripture Reading

John 15

Devotional

“Abide in me, and I in you.... Whoever abides in me and I in him, he it is that bears much fruit, for apart from me you can do nothing.” The image is simple and devastating in its honesty: a branch cut from the vine withers. It cannot produce life from within itself. It needs the vine. In the same way, we cannot sustain spiritual life, produce genuine fruit, or experience true joy if we are not staying connected to Jesus. Revival flowing upward is really just the description of what abiding looks like, hearts turned toward Jesus, staying close to Him in His Word and prayer, remaining in His love. The fruit of the Spirit does not come from effort. It comes from abiding. And the joy Jesus promises, “that my joy may be in you, and that your joy may be full,” is the overflow of a life that stays close.

Spiritual Discipline

Scripture Memorization. Find a verse in John 15 to commit to memory this week.

Prayer

Lord Jesus, I am the branch and You are the vine. I cannot do this without You. Help me abide, to stay close, to remain connected, to make my home in You. Let Your joy fill me as I do. Amen.

Week 6 - Day 1 - The Spirit Who Convicts

Bottom Line

The Holy Spirit convicts us of sin not to condemn us, but to lead us to freedom.

Prayer Prompt

Holy Spirit, I open my heart to Your work today. Search me. Convict me where I need to be convicted. And lead me into freedom. In Jesus' name, amen.

Scripture Reading

John 16:1-15

Devotional

“When he comes, he will convict the world concerning sin and righteousness and judgment.” The Holy Spirit is not sent only to comfort us. He is also sent to convict us. And in a culture that prefers affirmation to conviction, this truth is one we must receive with humility. Biblical conviction is not condemnation. Condemnation pushes us away from God in shame and despair. Conviction draws us back to God in honesty and repentance. The Spirit reveals what is wrong in our hearts so that we can be made right. He shows us sin not to crush us, but to free us.

Revival flowing inward always begins with this: the willingness to be searched. Not to search ourselves with anxious self-examination, but to say, with David, “Search me, O God, and know my heart.” Then to receive what the Spirit reveals, not with shame, but with the confidence that the One who convicts is also the One who cleanses.

Prayer

Holy Spirit, search me. I open my heart to You today, not with fear, but with trust. Show me what needs to change. And then help me run to the cross, not away from it. In Jesus' name, amen.

Week 6 - Day 3 - Sanctify Them in the Truth

Bottom Line

God's greatest prayer for us is that we would be made holy.

Prayer Prompt

Father, Jesus prayed for me, that I would be sanctified in the truth. Help me take that seriously today. In Jesus' name, amen.

Scripture Reading

John 17:1-19

Devotional

John 17 is unlike anything else in Scripture. We are allowed to listen as the Son of God prays to His Father, and what Jesus prays for His disciples tells us everything about what God desires for us. "Sanctify them in the truth; your word is truth." To sanctify means to set apart, to make holy. Jesus is not praying for His disciples to be comfortable, successful, or trouble-free. He is praying that they would be made holy. That the truth of God's Word would do its transforming work in them, setting them apart for God's purposes. This is God's great desire for you. Not merely that you would be happy, but that you would be holy, that your life would increasingly reflect the character of Jesus. Revival flowing inward is God answering this prayer in the lives of His people. It is the sanctifying work of the Spirit, applied through the truth of the Word, making us more like Jesus.

Spiritual Discipline of Confession and Repentance

John 17 is the High Priestly prayer of Jesus, and one thing He prays is that His people would be sanctified in the truth. The Spirit's work of conviction, which is a theme in chapter 16, leads believers to honest confession before God. Today and throughout the week, spend time in self-examination and confession. A great prayer is Psalm 139:23-24, where David says, "Search me, O God." Remember, 1 John 1:9 promises that when we confess, "He is faithful and just to forgive us and cleanse us from all unrighteousness."

Prayer

Father, I receive this prayer of Jesus over my life. Sanctify me in the truth. Do the deep, transforming work that only You can do. Make me more like Jesus, not for my own comfort, but for Your glory. Amen.

Week 6 - Day 5 - Not My Will, But Yours

Bottom Line

The deepest revival is the surrender of our will to the Father's.

Prayer Prompt

Father, I want what you want. But I confess I often find that hard. Help me get there today. In Jesus' name, amen.

Scripture Reading

John 18:1-4, Luke 22:39-46

Devotional

In the garden of Gethsemane, Jesus faces the full weight of what lies ahead, and He goes there willingly. When the soldiers and officers arrive to arrest Him, Jesus steps forward: "Whom do you seek?" He is not dragged away. He goes as a man in full control of Himself, surrendering by choice. This is the pattern that the Synoptic Gospels make explicit: "Not my will, but yours, be done." In the most costly moment in all of history, Jesus models the deepest posture of revival, the willing surrender of His own desires to the Father's plan. Revival flowing inward ultimately comes to this: the daily surrender of our will, our preferences, our comfort, our timelines, our plans. Not because God is harsh, but because we trust that His will is better than ours, just as Jesus trusted that the Father's plan, even through the cross, was the only path to resurrection.

Prayer

Father, not my will, but Yours. I release what I have been holding tightly. I trust that your plan is better, even when I cannot see it. Have Your way in me. In Jesus' name, amen.

Week 7 - Day 1 - The Garden of Betrayal

Bottom Line

Jesus went willingly to the cross. No one took His life, He laid His life down.

Prayer Prompt

Lord Jesus, You walked into the garden knowing what was coming. Help me not to rush past that. Help me sit with what Your willingness cost you. In Your name, amen.

Scripture Reading

John 18:1-14

Devotional

Jesus crossed the Kidron Valley and entered the garden of Gethsemane with His disciples. He knows what is coming. John tells us that Judas, who had already left the table to betray Him, knew the place because Jesus often met there with His disciples. The betrayer leads the soldiers straight to Him. Jesus does something that stops everything: He steps forward. He doesn't retreat or hide. He moved forward and asked, "Whom do you seek?" When they said they were looking for Jesus of Nazareth, He replied, "I am he." The Bible tells us that the soldiers fell back to the ground at the words of Jesus. Even in being arrested, Jesus held all the power. When Peter draws his sword to defend Jesus, Jesus tells him to put it away. Why? Because Jesus was not trapped. He was surrendered to the will of the Father. He knew that what He was about to go through on the cross would change everything.

Prayer

Lord Jesus, 'It is finished.' Help me believe that fully today, not just intellectually, but in the way I approach You, myself, and others. Send me out as someone who carries good news. Amen.

Week 7 - Day 2 - What is Truth?

Bottom Line

Jesus stood before the powerful and told the truth. Why? Because Jesus is truth.

Prayer Prompt

Lord Jesus, You stood before Pilate without flinching. Give me the same courage to stand in the truth of who You are. Whatever it costs, I want to surrender to You. In Jesus' name, amen.

Scripture Reading

John 18:15-40

Devotional

The religious leaders bring Jesus to Pilate because they want a death sentence they cannot legally carry out themselves. Pilate questions Jesus, and Jesus answers in a way that is neither defensive or evasive. He speaks plainly: His kingdom is not of this world, and He came into the world to bear witness to the truth. Pilate's response is one of the most haunting lines in all of Scripture: 'What is truth?' He asks the question and then walks away without waiting for an answer. He is standing in front of Truth and can't recognize it. Pilate finds no guilt in Jesus and yet hands Him over anyway. He knows what is right and chooses what is convenient. This is what happens when we allow the fear of people to outweigh the fear of God. Jesus, by contrast, never wavers. He is the Truth, and He will not deny Himself to make the moment easier.

Prayer

Lord Jesus, You did not bend the truth to save Yourself. Help me not bend it either. I don't want to choose my comfort or my reputation over You. Give me courage to stand in what is truth, because You are the Truth. In Jesus' name, amen.

Week 7 - Day 3 - Behold the Man

Bottom Line

Jesus was mocked, beaten, and rejected so that we could be accepted.

Prayer Prompt

Lord Jesus, they put a crown of thorns on Your head and called it a joke. Let me never treat lightly what You endured. In Your matchless name, amen.

Scripture Reading

John 19:1-16

Devotional

Pilate had Jesus flogged. The soldiers twisted together a crown of thorns and pressed it onto His head. They dress Him in a purple robe, the color of royalty, and mock Him. Then Pilate brings Him out before the crowd. Pilate says, "Behold the man," and means it as a spectacle. Here is this beaten, humiliated figure. What threat could He possibly be? But John means something far deeper. Behold the man. Look at Him. This is the Son of God in the fullest expression of His love for you. Love on display. He absorbed what we deserved so we would never have to. Isaiah saw this moment 700 hundred years before it happened. He said, "He was despised and rejected, a man of sorrows, acquainted with grief, He bore our griefs and carried our sorrows." The thorns that pressed into His skull were the curse of a fallen world. Yet Jesus wore them willingly... understand this... for you.

Prayer

Lord Jesus, they mocked You. You are the King and they didn't know it. They didn't recognize You, Honestly, like the hymn said, I would have "heard my mocking voice" in the crowd, too. Thank You for saving me anyways. In Jesus' name, amen.

Week 7 - Day 4 - It Is Finished

Bottom Line

The debt of your sin has been paid in full. There is nothing left to add.

Prayer Prompt

Lord Jesus, You said 'It is finished.' Help me live today from that finished work, not working for Your love, but working from it. Amen.

Scripture Reading

John 19:17-30

Devotional

"It is finished." Three words in English. One word in Greek: Tetelestai. It was a word used in the ancient world on receipts to indicate that a debt had been paid in full. Jesus is not saying He is merely done suffering. He is declaring that the debt of sin has been paid, completely, finally, once and for all. There is nothing left to add. Nothing more to earn. The work of salvation is complete. This is the message we carry into the world. Not "try harder." Not "become a better version of yourself." The message is: the debt has been paid. The price has been settled. Come. Because revival that flows outward is not the announcement of a program or an event. It is the proclamation of a finished work.

Prayer

Lord Jesus, 'It is finished.' Help me believe that fully today, not just intellectually, but in the way I approach You, myself, and others. Send me out as someone who carries good news. Amen.

Week 7 - Day 5 - The Burial

Bottom Line

Jesus truly died. The darkness of Saturday is real, and it is not the end.

Prayer Prompt

Lord, help me to sit in the weight of the cross before I rush into the resurrection. Help me feel what Saturday felt like. In Jesus' name, amen.

Scripture Reading

John 19:31-42

Devotional

After Jesus dies, a soldier pierces His side with a spear. Blood and water pour out. John records this as an eyewitness, making sure we understand: this was not a swoon, not a near-death experience. Jesus truly died. The body is taken down by Joseph of Arimathea, a secret disciple, and Nicodemus, the man who came to Jesus at night in John 3. Both men step out of the shadows at the moment it seems there is nothing left to gain. They wrap His body with linen cloths and spices, the burial custom of the day, and lay Him in a borrowed tomb. The stone is rolled into place and then there is silence.

We live on the other side of Sunday, so we read these verses knowing what comes next. But the disciples did not. For them, Saturday was a day of total devastation. Everything they had believed, hoped, and given their lives to was wrapped in burial cloths and sealed behind a stone. Do not rush past this. The darkness of Saturday is real. Grief is real. And God is present in it, even when He seems absent. He is always at work.

Prayer

Lord Jesus, 'It is finished.' Help me believe that fully today, not just intellectually, but in the way I approach You, myself, and others. Send me out as someone who carries good news. Amen.

Week 8 - Day 1 - The Empty Tomb

Bottom Line

The tomb is empty and that changes everything.

Prayer Prompt

Risen Lord, You are not in the tomb. You are alive. Help me live in that reality today, not as a doctrine to just believe, but as a truth I am living from. In Jesus' name, amen.

Scripture Reading

John 20:1-10

Devotional

Mary Magdalene comes to the tomb while it is still dark. She finds the stone rolled away and runs to tell Peter and the other disciples. They race to the tomb. The other disciple (John, don't you love how the writer throws that detail in here?) outruns Peter and arrives first, but stops at the entrance. Peter goes straight in. He sees the linen cloths lying there, and the face cloth folded separately. Then the other disciple enters, sees, and believes. The detail of the folded face cloth has always struck readers. A stolen body is removed in haste. A folded cloth is the deliberate act of someone who left on His own terms. The tomb is empty not because someone took Him. It is empty because He rose. John tells us the disciples did not yet understand the Scripture, that Jesus must rise from the dead. They were seeing the evidence before they had the framework to interpret it. Sometimes we encounter the reality of the risen Christ before we fully understand what it means. What matters is that we see, and believe.

Prayer

Risen Lord, You are alive. That changes everything. Help me live today not as someone managing a religion, but as someone who has encountered the living God. Send me to tell someone. Amen.

Week 8 - Day 3 - Peace Be With You

Bottom Line

The risen Jesus walks through locked doors and sends His people into the world.

Prayer Prompt

Lord Jesus, You passed through locked doors to reach Your disciples. Come through whatever is closed in my heart today. In Jesus' name, amen.

Scripture Reading

John 20:19-23

Devotional

The evening of that same Sunday, the disciples are gathered behind locked doors, afraid of the Jewish leaders. And then Jesus is simply there, standing among them. He does not knock. He does not wait for them to open the door. He comes to them where they are, fear and all, and speaks the first word of the resurrection age: "Peace be with you." He shows them His hands and His side. The same Jesus who was crucified is the one who is risen. The wounds are real. The resurrection is real. And the disciples go from fear to joy in a moment. Then Jesus commissions them: "As the Father has sent me, even so I am sending you." He breathes on them and says, "Receive the Holy Spirit." This is the shape of revival that flows outward. It begins with an encounter with the risen Jesus in the middle of our fear. It continues with His peace settling over us. And it ends with His sending, equipping us with the same Spirit that raised Him from the dead and calling us to carry the message of forgiveness to the world.

Prayer

Lord Jesus, come through the locked doors. Speak Your peace over my fear. And then send me. I do not want to stay hidden. Give me the courage and the Spirit to go where You are calling me. Amen.

Week 8 - Day 5 - Do You Love Me?

Bottom Line

Jesus restores the broken and commissions them with purpose. Failure is never the final word.

Prayer Prompt

Lord Jesus, You ask me what You asked Peter: do you love me? Help me answer that honestly, and then help me live in obedience to what You've called me to. In Your holy name, amen.

Scripture Reading

John 21

Devotional

Jesus has a charcoal fire going on the beach with fish and bread. The last time Peter was near a charcoal fire, he was rejecting that he even knew Jesus. Here, instead of scolding Peter and the disciples, Jesus feeds them. He turns to Peter, and asks him three times: "Do you love me?" Three denials, three questions. Each time Peter says yes, Jesus gives him the same commission: tend my lambs, shepherd my sheep, follow me. Peter is not sidelined by his failure. He is restored through it and sent back into the mission with greater purpose than before. This is the final scene of the Gospel of John. And the final word Jesus speaks to Peter, and to us, is the same word He spoke at the very beginning: follow me. Forty days ago you began this journey. You have encountered the God who is, who saves, who speaks. You have been positioned, revived, and transformed. Now the risen Christ stands on the shore of your life and asks the only question that matters: do you love me? If the answer is yes, then go. Feed His sheep. Follow Him. The world is waiting.

Prayer

Lord Jesus, You know everything, and You know that I love You. I have not loved You perfectly, but I love You. Take that love and do something with it. Send me where you need me. Let me feed whoever you place in front of me. And help me follow You, one day at a time, for the rest of my life. Amen.



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
